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Auditors' Report

To the Members of The Ross Memorial Hospital

We have audited the balance sheet of The Ross Memorial Hospital as at March 31, 2007 and the statements of revenue and expenditures, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Hospital's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

The Ross Memorial Hospital Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

March 31, 2007

Nature of Business

The Hospital is engaged in the provision of various health care services in the City of Kawartha Lakes, Brock Township and parts of Haliburton County. The Hospital is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and accordingly is exempt from income taxes, provided certain requirements of the Income Tax Act are met.

Cash and Short-term Deposits

Cash and short-term deposits consist of cash on hand, bank balances and investments in money market instruments with maturities of three months or less.

Presentation

The financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Revenue Recognition

The Hospital follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions which include donations and government grants.

Under the Health Insurance Act and Regulations thereto, the Facility is funded primarily by the Province of Ontario in accordance with budget arrangements established by the Ministry of Health. Operating grants are recorded as revenue in the period to which they relate. Grants approved but not received at the end of an accounting period are accrued. Where a portion of a grant relates to a future period, it is deferred and recognized in that subsequent period. Where grant revenues are subject to subsequent adjustment or reconciliation, such adjustments are estimated and recorded as due to/from the Ministry of Health at the end of the fiscal year. These financial statements reflect agreed arrangements approved by the Ministry with respect to the year ended March 31, 2007.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Externally restricted contributions other than endowment contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenditures are recognized. Contributions restricted for the purchase of capital assets are deferred and amortized into revenue at a rate corresponding with the amortization rate for the related capital assets.

Endowment contributions are recognized as direct increases in endowment net assets as detailed in the Notes to these statements.

Restricted investment income is recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenditures are recognized. Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

Revenue from the Provincial Insurance Plan, preferred accommodation, and marketed services is recognized when the goods are sold or the service is provided.

Contributed Services

A substantial number of volunteers contribute a significant amount of their time each year. Because of the difficulty of determining the fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Investments

Investments are recorded at cost. Should the market value of investments become lower than cost and this decline in value is considered to be other than temporary, the investments are written down to market value.

Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of average cost and replacement value.

Capital Assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. Repairs and maintenance costs are charged to expense. Betterments which extend the estimated life of an asset are capitalized. When a capital asset no longer contributes to the Facility's ability to provide services, its carrying amount is written down to its residual value. Any gains or losses on disposal are charged to amortization expense.

Capital assets are amortized on a straight-line basis using the following annual rates:

Buildings	2% - 6.67%
Building contine actions	270 - 0.0770
Building service equipment	5% - 10%
Major equipment	5% - 20%
Computers	20% - 33%

Compensated Absences Compensation expense is accrued for all employees as entitlement to these payments is earned, in accordance with the Hospital's benefit plans for vacation, sick leave and retirement allowances.

Financial Instruments

The hospital utilizes various financial instruments. Unless otherwise noted, it is managements opinion that the hospital is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments and the carrying amounts approximate fair values.

Employee Benefit Plans

The Hospital accrues its obligations under employee benefit plans and the related costs, net of plan assets (Note 6). The costs of pensions and other future benefits have been actuarially determined. The Hospital applies defined contribution accounting to its multi-employer defined benefit plan for which the Hospital has insufficient information to apply defined benefit plan accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from management's best estimates, as additional information becomes available in the future.

6. Employee Future Benefits

The Hospital sponsors both defined benefit and defined contribution employee future benefit plans covering substantially all employees. The costs of employee future benefits are accrued over the periods in which employees earn the benefits. The plan provides extended health and dental as well as life insurance to employees.

Actuarial valuations for accounting purposes are performed triennially using the projected benefit method prorated on services. The most recent actuarial report was prepared at April 1, 2004. The accrued benefit obligation of \$2,204,500 shown for 2007 is based on an extrapolation of that April 1, 2004 valuation.

The unamortized past service cost of \$102,900 is to be amortized on a straight-line basis over the average remaining period to the full eligibility date (9.0 years). Additional past service costs of \$94,000 have been recognized for benefit improvements and the addition of OPSEU employees. The amortization commenced April 2002.

The actuarial valuation was based on a number of assumptions about future events, such as inflation rates, interest rates, medical inflation rates, wage and salary increases, and employee turnover and mortality. The assumptions used reflect the hospital's best estimates. The discount rate used to determine the accrued benefit obligation is 5.25%, the dental cost increase is 4.5%, and Extended Health Care increase is 7.5%. The % rate for Extended Health Care is decreasing by 1% increments per annum to an ultimate rate of 4.5%.

Substantially all of the employees of the Hospital are members of the Hospitals of Ontario Pension Plan and the costs of this pension is actuarially determined.

The post-employment benefit expense is reported as a component of current expenditures on the statement of financial activities. Composition of the amount is as follows:

7. Related Party Transactions

The Hospital has the ability to appoint two of the Ross Memorial Hospital Foundation (the "Foundation") Board of Directors. The Foundation was established to raise and manage funds for the benefit of the Hospital. The Foundation is incorporated as a public foundation under the Canada Corporations Act and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. Net resources of the Foundation amount to approximately \$5,500,000, of which \$694,000 represents contributions externally restricted, with the balance being available to the hospital for uses consistent with the intent of the donors and the objects of the foundation at the discretion of the Foundation's Board of Directors.

The net assets and results from operations of the Foundation are not included in the statements of the Hospital. Separate financial statements of the Foundation are available upon request.

The Ross Memorial Hospital Auxiliary (the "Auxiliary") provides periodic capital funding to the Hospital through the Hospital Foundation. The Hospital uses these contributions as designated by the Auxiliary.

Related party transactions during the year not separately disclosed in the financial statements include the following:

- a. an amount of \$699,500 (2006 \$3,309,624) has been received from the Foundation and recorded as deferred contributions related to capital assets.
- b. an amount of \$36,500 (2006 \$7,500) has been received from the Foundation and netted against the related expenditure for which the money was provided.
- c. an amount of \$4,000 (2006 \$4,000) representing rental charges has been received from the Foundation and recorded with marketed services.

8. Contingencies

The nature of the Hospital's activities is such that there is usually litigation pending or in prospect at any time. With respect to claims at March 31, 2007 management believes the hospital has valid defences and appropriate insurance coverage in place. In the event any claims are successful, management believes that such claims are not expected to have a material effect on the Hospital's financial position.

The hospital has access to bank credit facilities to a maximum of \$3,000,000.

10. Ministry of Health PCOP Funding

During the Hospital Expansion Phase from March 2004 to March 2006, the Ministry of Health advanced funds under their Post Construction Operating Plan (PCOP) that were to be used to finance anticipated service volume targets. The target volumes were not met and the Hospital reported these funds as a liability which had accumulated to \$4,243,000 at March 31, 2005.

In March 2006, the Ministry of Health forgave the recovery of PCOP funding for all fiscal years to and including 2006. As a result of this action by the Ministry of Health, the hospital eliminated the accumulated liability and recognized \$4,243,906 as revenue in fiscal 2006. Due to uncertainty regarding the fiscal 2006 funding, a liability of \$1,000,000 was set up as a potential loss of funding for fiscal 2006. The Hospital has been advised by the Ministry of Health that the 2006 service funding shortfall was forgiven and therefore this liability has been reversed resulting in \$1,000,000 being recognized as revenue of the current year.

The Hospital did not meet the required target service volumes for some programs in 2007 and was informed by the Ministry of Health that these 2007 PCOP funds would be subject to recovery by the Ministry. A liability of \$1,600,000 has been accrued representing the potential recovery of these 2007 funds.
